Letter from the Principal

As we approach our special anniversary year it was good to meet so many of you at the launch of the excellent new history of the two schools, so well authored by Alan Akeroyd and Caroline Clifford. If you haven't yet purchased a copy, I can highly recommend it.

Our very own 'waterfall cascade of poppies,' which adorned the PAC during the week of 10 - 14 November, provided a fitting backdrop for the remembrance services we held for each year group in this centenary year. As well as the poppies, each year group was piped into assembly by our very own master of the pipes, Tony Best, dressed in full Scottish regalia.

I believe it is important to pass on the traditions of remembrance to the next generation and to spend time in remembering just how much we owe our freedom to those who sacrificed their lives in earlier conflicts. We also acknowledged the sense of duty and service shown by those members of the armed forces, some of whom are in our parent body, and how much we can learn from their example.

One of the OHA activities related to the 450th anniversary has been to identify and track down the oldest surviving former pupils of the school. To the best of our knowledge so far, these are Elizabeth Atkinson and Pip Harrison, pictured above at Elizabeth's 99th Birthday party at the end of September 2014.

Atkinson is Elizabeth's married name (and, by the strangest of coincidences, her late husband, Thomas, was a colleague of Peter Downes at Banbury School in the 1970s). When she was at school she was known as Betty Softly. Pip and she were in the Sixth Form at the same time (1932). Pip left school a year before Betty; he will be 100 in April 2015.

Both of them went on to be teachers. Pip was a primary school teacher and taught in several local schools, ending up as a headteacher. Pip still lives locally, in Houghton, and is a regular attender of OHA events.

Betty set up an independent prep school near Banbury and taught there for many years, retiring eventually to Moreton-in-Marsh. Shortly after her birthday party in September, she moved to live Germany so as to be closer to her only daughter, Jane, her grand-daughter and great-grand-daughter.

Peter Downes comments: 'It was a joy and a privilege to be invited to Betty's birthday party and to see Pip and her together again after such a long time. They were both in very good spirits and in remarkable health. An example to us all!'

If any readers of this Newsletter think they know somebody even more senior, we would be pleased to know.

OHA communications come into the 21st century!!

For obvious reasons we cannot publish every photo that has ever been taken of pupils and ex-pupils but we hope, over time, to build up a representative collection.

We will be starting with some items that were provided for the 2015 book (see page 4) and for which there was not space. If you have other items, please send them to Gary Buckenham, contacting him via the Archive page Contact Form to arrange scanning.

He will do his best to scan them and post them on the right bit of the Archives section. If you want the items back, please enclose a stamped addressed envelope. We look forward to hearing from you.

Valuing the past and moving forward into the future . . .

The OHA has existed for over 80 years. We have about 700 people on our mailing-list, most of whom were pupils at the Grammar School. About 12,000 young people have passed through Hinchingbrooke School since 1970 but very few of these are signed up with the OHA. Perhaps the word 'Old' puts them off, or they simply do not know much about the association. The OHA committee is in discussion with the school to see if we can find a way of merging the OHA into a 'Hinchingbrooke Alumni Association'. This might enable more recent ex-pupils to offer their experience and expertise to current pupils e.g. in careers advice and work experience, and/or to make donations in cash or in kind to the school today as a way of saying 'thank you'.

The OHA will contact you again before Easter 2015 to provide more details and to seek your support for the closure of the OHA and its incorporation into the HAA.

Hunts Phil joint concert

As part of the celebration of the 450th anniversary, the Hunts Phil Orchestra and Choir, whose concerts always take place in the School's Performing Arts Centre, will join forces with Hinchingbrooke's most talented young musicians on Saturday, November 7. The programme will include the 'Hinchingbrooke Suite', composed by former teacher Barry Russell.

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As you might imagine, the school's year since last I wrote has been as fast paced as ever and full of challenge and opportunity. The biggest challenge remains the budget projections going forward, which will mean further drastic reductions, largely as a result of changes to national insurance and pension contributions, none of which have been funded.

We now have 3 Directorates, and not four as I reported last year, which are proving very effective in the quest for improvement. Like me, many of you will remember 'O' levels being graded 1 - 9 until the change to letters in 1975. Well, we are to go back to a 1- 9 grading of GCSEs, as well as having new and more rigorous A level and GCSE content, which is to be taught from September 2015 and 2016 respectively.

AS levels and A levels are to be 'decoupled' making them separate qualifications, and there are other major changes to the way league tables are going to be constructed. We are used to constant change in education and these curriculum changes are being carefully planned, as is our response to the changes to the construction of the league tables.

Plus ça change, plus c'est la même chose!

A new history of the school: 1565 - 2015

The book commissioned by the OHA to mark the school's 450 years of existence is not just a run-of-the mill school history. It tells the story of how a small 16th century grammar school developed over 450 years into one of the largest comprehensive schools in the country. The special feature of the book is that It sets this development in the context of the many social changes that have taken place, both locally and nationally, over this period.

The authors are experienced local historians and they have been able to draw on a wide range of documents to illustrate the process of change.

Many former pupils and teachers from Huntingdon Grammar School and Hinchingbrooke School have also provided photographs, anecdotes and information.

This book will therefore be of interest not only to former members of the two schools but also to a wider public in Huntingdonshire.

Educational establishments exist to serve society and are also a reflection of it. The OHA hopes that this book will be a fitting contribution to the celebration of 450 years of Huntingdon Grammar School transformed into Hinchingbrooke School.
