From the CEO

As another school year draws rapidly to a close, I am pleased to offer you another ACES newsletter with some of the highlights from each of our schools.

I said a year ago that 'we are a small group of four Academies with lots of big ideas' and, thanks to the restrictions and demands of managing the Covid epidemic receding, some of those have now been able to be progressed.

It would be a mistake to think that Covid has disappeared completely, and schools are still finding themselves having to manage absences which are Covid-related from time to time, but there is nevertheless a sense of life returning to normality when compared to the recent past. End of term celebrations, school trips and face to face meetings have largely resumed, much to the relief of staff and students.

We have successfully implemented a new MIS called ARBOR into our primary schools and it will be rolled out at Hinchingbrooke from September. This will facilitate higher levels of consistency across the MAT as all schools will be using it for many of the routine and regular processes throughout the year.

Last Easter we were delighted to welcome Spaldwick Primary School to ACES Academies Trust. Spaldwick is one of two of the most northerly feeder schools to Hinchingbrooke and, though a small village school serving some 90 children, it will add to our expertise and sense of family. We welcome them wholeheartedly, as indeed we would any of the remaining feeder schools that have not yet joined us.

Our partnership working with the schools in Stevenage has come to an end and we are now working closely with another MAT called HEART based in Bedford. They are similar in size to ACES and, more importantly, aligned very closely to our way of doing things with a very similar culture and ethos. There has been a round of 'peer review' activity, which has not only given staff in the partner schools a chance to get to know each other but has also provided an opportunity to share practice and learn from each other. We intend to continue our close working with them next year.

We have a number of staff moving on to pastures new at the end of this academic year and I would add my thanks to those expressed by the Headteachers to all who have contributed to ACES in any capacity. From our central team I would like to make a special mention of three colleagues: Bonnie Goodwin who has been an invaluable 'specialist leader of education' (SLE) working in our primary schools; Rebecca Bierton who has been our SEND specialist and latterly has also taken on the role of primary standards and Margaret Medwell who has worked tirelessly in the Finance team, initially at Hinchingbrooke and then for ACES, for over 22 years. Thank you and very best wishes for the future.

I am pleased to say that we have made two new and excellent appointments to the central education team for next year. Simon Eardley joins us as Director of Primary Education after a highly successful career in education in Cambridgeshire schools culminating in 17 years of headship experience in Peterborough. In recent years he has been a founder member of the OWN Education Trust and also served as a lead Ofsted inspector. He brings a very valuable skill set to our trust and has already begun to get to know our schools. Antonia Drysdale is equally experienced in the area of SEND. Following a highly successful career in both mainstream and special schools, she has most recently been Headteacher of a special school in Bedford and her wealth of knowledge and experience, which includes opening a new free school, will be a very welcome addition to our team at ACES.

Finally, I would like to offer my thanks to all the Headteachers, senior teams and their staff in our schools; members of the Central Team, whether in the educational section or the 'back office'; the teams of governors and trustees that oversee our work and hold us to account and the many friends and supporters that have helped out along the way from the parent bodies and communities we serve.

HINCHINGBROOKE SCHOOL

We started the school year with a degree of normality, after two years that had been hugely COVID-affected. The COVID rate

amongst students and staff spiked at various times throughout the year, but overall the school has managed very well; for example, we have not had to shut the school or send a year group or year groups home at any point this year.

We increased the pupil admission number from September 2021, admitting 350 students into Year 7 (an increase of 50 students) for the first time. Coping with the increased admission number each year for the next four years will require careful management, but we are pleased to be able to meet the ongoing high demand for places at HBK.



In November 2021, the school was inspected by Ofsted under Section 8 of the Education Act. A Section 8 inspection of a school judged Good at its previous inspection seeks to determine whether the school remains Good. This was confirmed by the inspection outcome and the school is now on a journey 'From Good to Great' with both a 4-year strategic plan and one-year School Development Plans.

We have done a lot of work this year to embed the new Mission, Values and Key Focuses, and to embed the Hinchingbrooke Approach to Teaching – we see these as key to achieving our aim to be Great.

The summer term, in particular, has seen the very welcome resumption of key school events such as

'Glastonbrooke' and 'Picnic at the House', alongside our hugely impressive Dance Event, our School Production and our Sports Day!

Our students in Year 11 and Year 13 behaved impeccably throughout the exam season and we wait with high expectation, and optimism, to celebrate their achievements when the results are announced in August 2022.



Primary Schools SATs Results

Congratulations to all the staff and pupils at all our Primary schools for such excellent SAT's results this year. It has been a challenging year for staff in many ways but the dedication shown to ensuring the pupils were as ready as possible for their SAT's tests has been phenomenal.

All our Primaries achieved a combined expected standard in Reading, Writing and Maths of over 60% of the cohort which was well above the national combined of 52% of pupils at the expected standard. Areas of note are Godmanchester Bridge Academy Writing outcomes being formally moderated and achieving 73% at the expected standard. Godmanchester Community Academy achieved 82% of the cohort at expected standard in Maths and Spaldwick Primary School achieved 90% of pupils at the expected standard in the Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling assessment, 29% of these being at the Greater Depth standard. Cromwell Academy pupils achieved 87% at the expected standard in Reading and 40% at the Greater Depth standard.

A wonderful achievement for all out Year 6 leavers as they prepare for the next step of their education into Key Stage 3.

Our ACES Transition Project!

"Creating opportunities to collaborate cross phase and share good practice across our different settings, to secure the very best learning experiences for our children and young people."

We are delighted to have set up a two-year programme to look at curriculum transition and pedagogy across our communities. This term we have been focusing on:

- Supporting children and their families entitled to the Pupil Premium Fund through the transition from Y6 into Y7
- Reflecting on Y7 homework practices and offering Homework workshops to local Y6 classes.
- Development of Y6/7 phrase books where we identify key vocabulary for subject areas and make links between Primary and Secondary terminology.
- Identifying resources and techniques which support learning in Y6 and sharing this information with Y7 staff as they prepare their autumn term provision.

We are particularly keen to hear suggestions for ways in which staff might collaborate with their ACES colleagues in the other settings.
