

Set against the changing social culture of the 1950s, The Blackboard Jungle is a fascinating time capsule




that brilliantly illuminates an issue still in the forefront of our minds.


Handmaid's Tale by Margaret Atwood

She recalls her past life as the daughter of a feminist activist and a single mother and tries to survive in the oppressive society.


Wild Swan by Jung Chan

This book explores this idea as Libby Brooks talks to nine very different children between the ages of four and sixteen growing up in


