




“The Tudors: 1485-1603”



Films are a nice, easy way of getting in to a topic, helping you to understand the historical context of a period...

 <p>An amazing portrayal of the life of Thomas Cromwell, chief minister of Henry VIII (based on Hilary Mantel's excellent books)</p>	 <p>Not totally accurate in terms of historical details, but gives a sense of context of the early Tudors.</p>	 <p>Again, not totally accurate in terms of historical details, but gives a sense of context of the Elizabeth's early reign.</p>
 <p>Sequel to 'Elizabeth'. This film looks at the Armada – it stretches accuracy to the limit but is visually stunning and worth watching for Cate Blanchet's performance alone.</p>	 <p>An old one (1970s) but BRILLIANT! Mr Williams' favourite. Also look up the sequel 'Elizabeth R' which gives a superb representation of Elizabeth and her council.</p>	 <p>Helen Mirren's great performance as Elizabeth I. Better than the films in terms of accuracy.</p>
 <p>Another, more accurate mini-series about Elizabeth I</p>	 <p>A super documentary covering the background to the course leading up to Bosworth</p>	 <p>A documentary exploring the reign of Henry VIII and his key ministers.</p>
